

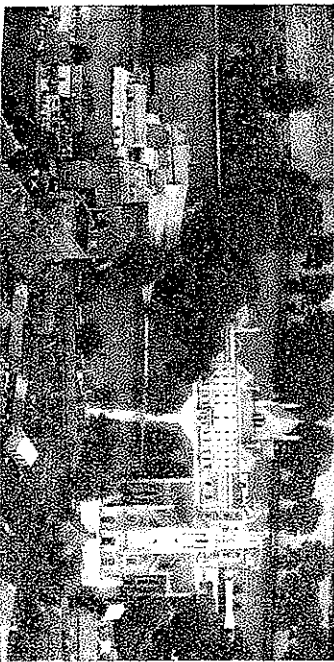

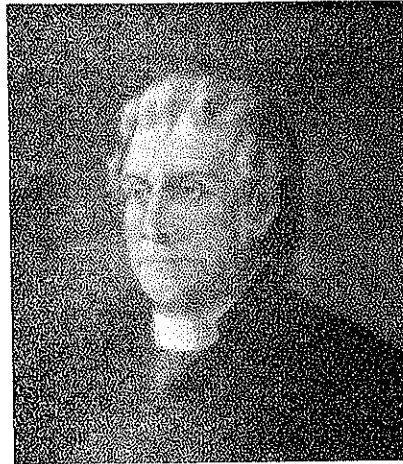
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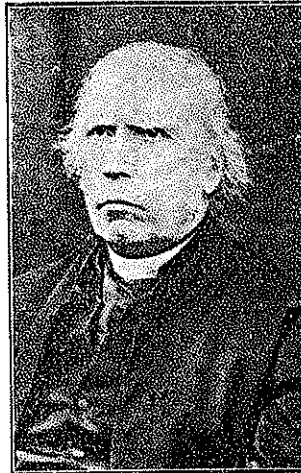

Walsh, Rev. John.

1 Oct., 1793—1 Aug., 1796. [P.P., Borris; died 6 Sept., 1836. A nephew of Father Banchfield, P.P., Hacketstown, 1771-1814. Fr. John Walsh, P.P., was an uncle of Fr. John Walsh, C.C., Borris; a grand-uncle of the late Dr. Walsh, Graignamanagh, and great grand-uncle of Dr. Michael Donohoe, Rector, Knockbeg, 1920-27. Cf. Comerford III, 169. For Fr. Walsh, C.C., cf. John Walsh, exten 1814-17, and John Walsh, bca:dar 1817-22. Lowergange, where Mrs. Richard Donohoe and her family reside, was the birthplace of both Fr. Walshs, uncle and nephew].

Riely, Rev. Matthew.

1 Oct., 1793—1 Aug., 1796. Debit and credit bedstead £1 2s. 9d. (1 guinea) Dr. and Cr. bedstead and curtains £2 16s. 10½ [P.P., Philipstown, 1805; d. 1825].

Byrne, Rev. James.

1 Oct., 1793—1 Aug., 1796. Bedstead and curtains entries as for Rev. M. Riely. [P.P., Ballyadams; died 7 Feb., 1816. Of the O'Byrnes of Timogue, he was born in Luggacurran, was a nephew of Fr. James Barron, P.P., Maryboro', 1759-89, and a near kinsman of Fr. James Kilbride, P.P., Clonmore, 1860-66. Cf. O'Byrne, History of Queen's Co., pp. 84-5, and Comerford III, 134].

Murphy, Rev. James.

1 Oct., 1793—1 Aug., 1796. Died C.C., Ballinakill.

Clery, Rev. John.

1 Oct., 1793—1 Aug., 1796. Dr. and Cr. bedstead and curtains £2 10s. 11d. [P.P., Myshall, where there is a Latin epitaph to him. D. 1816].

Comerford, Rev. William.

1 Oct., 1793—19 April, 1794. Died at College. [Buried at Clopoke, his native place].

Duane, Rev. Thady.

1 Oct., 1793—1 Aug., 1796. Dr. and Cr. bedstead and curtains £2 10s. 11d. [P.P., Clonastee and Rosenallis, 1811; d. 1828].

Nowlan, Rev. Daniel.

1 Oct., 1793—1 Aug., 1796. [P.P., Kill, 1804; Paulstown, 1823. "Fr. Daniel Nowlan, a kinsman of the late V.G., Monsig. or B.ophy, was P.P., Kill, from 1804 to 1823. He built the Church in Kill. He opposed Lord Cloncurry, son of a pervert, over the use of Scriptures in the schools. J.K.L., who was on visiting terms with Cloncurry, translated Fr. Dan and made him first P.P. of the newly-formed parish of Paulstown and Goresbridge. Fr. Nowlan died in 1829. By his own desire he was buried in Kill Church amid the prayers and blessings of a sorrowing people. A handsome mural tablet was erected to his memory "by his grateful and affectionate brother."—Fr. O'Farrell. Cf. Comerford II, 183; III, 336. Fitzpatrick II, 118-19, 193; I, 139. That J.K.L.'s high opinion of Cloncurry was not shared by Fr. James Maher, P.P.; Bishop Haly, or Dr. Geoghegan, P.P., V.G., is clear from Fitzpatrick II, 119, and Comerford II, 167-8. The number of years he was P.P., as given on his epitaph, Comerford II, 172, should probably read 19. J.K.L.'s Clergy List of 1820 states that Frs. Dan and Thomas were natives of Myshall; they were, probably, from Ballinrush, Ballaghmore or Shangarry. Between 1661 and 1674 Daniel Nowlan, Irish Papist, owned 523 acres in Shangarry and Ballinrush.—(Dr. Miller, History of the Berrow Valley, "Nationalist and Leinster Times," 6 April, 1935). There were two other Frs. Nowlan, brothers, and natives of Myshall, about this time. They were Fathers Tom and John, who were born in Ballinrush. Fr. Tom was Adm. in Turow and Ballyfin before he became P.P., Abbeyeix, where he died 1886. Fr. John was successively P.P. in Killeigh and Kildare, and died 1880. Fr. Nowlan of Leighlin, who was appointed C.C., Graignamanagh, in 1815, was Fr. Michael, and evidently Michael Nowlan of Co. Kilkenny, Carlow student 1807-12; Leighlin parish up to 1823 included Paulstown. Fr. Michael died P.P., Myshall, 1852, aged 60. He may have been a brother of Martin

Nowlan, L. and K., of Co. Kilkenny, Carlow student 1816-18, who died P.P., Kilh. in 1849, aged 55. Fr. Dan, P.P., Kilh. is to be distinguished from three other priests of the same name, viz.: Fr. Daniel Nowlan, P.P., Clonegal, who died 1759—wid. Fr. Brady's addenda to Comerford; Fr. Daniel Nowlan, late of Whitehall, who was drowned near Moneybegs, 1794 (ibid.), and Fr. Daniel brother of Bishop Nowlan, and P.P., Leighlin, 1838-7.

Kelly, Mr. Michael.

21 Oct. 1793—Dec. 1796. 21 Oct. 1793, £11 7s. 6d. per Rev. Mr. O'Neill. [P.P., Clonboullogue, 1805-1823].

21 Oct. 1793—1 May, 1798. Day Scholar. 22 Sept. 1795.

Egan, James.

21 Oct. 1793—Jan. 1794. Day Scholar. Kinella, Darby, Ballynurey.

21 Oct. 1793—12 April, 1797. Day Scholar to 23 Sept. 1794. 20 guineas.

[Ballynurey in the parish of Balton was the birthplace of William Kinella, 1812, afterwards Bishop of Ossory, q.v.]

Fitzgerald, Richard.

21 Oct. 1793—Oct. 1796. Day Scholar. [Cf. Fr. Richard Fitzgerald of Carlow, P.P., Kilteshin, 1787-23, and Fr. Richard Fitzgerald, P.P., Graigamanagh, 1796-1805].

Kesfe, Mr. Marks, Ballyshannon.

23 Oct. 1793—1 July, 1797. Dr. and Ct. beheaded £1 2s. 9d.

Gorman, Master Pat, Co. Carlow.

22 Nov. 1793—14 May, 1806. Absent 8 June, 1804, to 14 Nov. 1805. Four cows were sold to the College as part pension during the period, *c.f.* Messrs. Gorman, Bishinstown, 1808-09.

Callaghan, Mr. Owen, Tullow.

22 Nov. 1793—1 Aug. 1797. [In 1798 Fr. John Murphy was executed with great cruelty and his body burned outside Mr. O'Callaghan's, now Mrs. Dempsey's, of Tullow. Mr. O'Callaghan was compelled to open his windows so that his family should be "entertained with a holy effluence." Comerford III., 392-3. The future J.K.L. visited Callaghan's in Feb.

1814—Fitzpatrick, I. 60. The Deputies q.v. were evidently relatives of Callaghan's.]

Stafford, Mr. Philip, Co. Westford.

19 Dec. 1793—19 June, 1797. Later Rev. [Cf. Fr. Stafford, P.P., Ballindaggin, 1804-15—Fr. Ranson, C.C.]

Fitzpatrick, Mr. Edmund, Mountbawn.

2 Jan. 1794—23 May 1796. 5 guineas entrance returned to him per order of Dr. Delany.

Dunn, John, Carlow.

7 Jan. 1794—Mar. 1801. Day Scholar. Oct. 1797. Also Rev. [Cf. Rev. John Dunne, who died in Baltinglass, 1821. Also James Dunn, wine, spirit, timber and coal merchant, Carlow, Graigav. 1788].

McDonnell, James, Co. Kildare.

7 Jan. 1794—1 July, 1799. Day Scholar to 21 Oct. 1795. Also McDonnell.

McDonnell, Dennis, Carlow.

12 Jan. 1794—14 Dec. 1795. Day Scholar to 26 Nov. 1795. [Cf. Wm. McDonnell, brewer, Castle St., 1788].

Kinella, Thomas, [Ballynurey] Co. Carlow.

13 Jan. 1794—April, 1796. Day Scholar to 13 Sept. 1794. 20 guineas. Thomas and James are brothers, and it is very probable they are brothers of Darby of Ballynurey. As they were the only Kinellas in the College it was not necessary to specify Thomas' and James' address further. Thomas' *sic*, as boarder follows immediately that of Darby as boarder.

16 Jan. 1794—16 July, 1796. Day Scholar. Also McDonnell.

Finn, Pat.

20 Jan. 1794—11 Feb. 1804. Day Scholar to 5 May, 1800. 11 Feb. 1804, 3 guineas paid for vacation. Sons of William Finn, tanner, Castle St., and nephews of Edmund Finn who in 1766 founded "Finn's Lanthorn Journal," which in 1830 became "Kilkenny Journal" (Madara, Irish Periodical Literature, p. 328). William Finn was Constable W. P. Finn, who became M.P. for Kil-

kenny. He was married to a sister of Dara O'Connell and lived at Northcot Lane, now Cox's Lane, where Mr. T. Pendergast now lives. The spacious room at the left of the hall-door was built to receive the Liberator, C.F. Fitzpatrick. [Life of Dr. Doyle, I., 257, II., 249. William senior was one of the four witnesses to the lease of the plot on which the Cathedral stands to Rev. Henry Shannon on 16 May, 1799.

Shea, John (also M.), Co. Westford.

6 Dec. 1794—6 Aug. 1794. Day Scholar. [Accounts and index show that this John Shea is distinct from John Shea, boarder 1794-97.]

Hughes, Dennis, Carlow.

17 Feb. 1794—17 May, 1796. Day Scholar. Dowling, Murragh, Queen's County.

17 Feb. 1794—17 May, 1794. Day Scholar. Moore, Mr. Patrick, Tullow.

17 Feb. 1794—20 Nov., 1798. Apr. 1797, cash received by potatoes, £9 12s. 6d. Dec. 1800, cash per Jas. Nowlan, Tullow, £8 5s. 6d. [P.P., Rathvilly; died 1839. J.K.L. distinguishes the Moores of Tullow from the Moores of Lais (Laughis). Their old home was on Tullow Hill. Their land is owned by Mr. Leyburn: the old house is down, James Nolan of Tullow, through whom Patrick's pension was paid, was evidently a Tullow merchant. He lived at the Corner House now occupied by Misses Kiernan and Whitty. He was Patrick's brother-in-law—married to his sister Mary—and father of the future bishop, Edward Nolan. Cf. Comerford I., 1222.]

Hartly, Maurice, Queen's County.

24 Sept. 1794—1 Sept. 1799. Day Scholar. Also per Hartly. [Cf. Maurice Hartly, Carlow, 1803-4. Fr. Maurice Hart of Arkes, P.P., Ballydunns, 1816-44. Cf. Fitzpatrick I., 140, 287, II., 456. The late John Hart, weighmaster at Watson's, and

father of Mrs. Haughey, St. Kilhan's Crescent, was a near relative of Fr. Hartly.]

D'wiling, William, Co. Kildare.

7 Mar. 1794—7 June, 1796. Day Scholar. De-ohos, Darby.

13 Mar. 1794—July, 1795. Day Scholar. Butler, Master Pat, Fishamble St., Dublin.

30 June, 1794—30 June, 1798. [Mr. Edward Butler, Fishamble St., was from 1794 a large supplier of fish, peas, greeneries, etc.—to the College. He handed the debentures and fire insurance of the College. Dublin students paid their pensions through him. By 1803 he had moved to Lower Ormond Quay.]

Shea, John (also Rev.), Colchester Co. Westford

10 Sept. 1794—10 Mar. 1797. [P.P., Baltinglass, 1807-1831. Fr. O'Shea's name is, or was, on the brass knocker of the C.C.'s door. Fr. O'Shea bought this house; prior to this he lived where Mrs. Mat Byrne now lives on Chapel Hill near the cemetery. The house then consisted of the hall and room to the right; he added the room to the left. Fr. Dan Lalor, P.P., 1831-71, acquired the parochial property and built the parochial house, while his curate, Fr. John Nolan, built the Church. Probably during this time the roof was raked.—Fr. E. Kinella, P.P., Doonane, who paid a tribute to Mr. Thos. Doran, Deerpark, the local authority on such matters. Cf. J.K.L.'s letter to Fr. Shea on how he was to provide his people with a Catholic education.—Fitzpatrick I., 1181.]

13 Sept. 1794—1 Aug. 1798. Pension 20 guineas. [P.P. of Templedigan and Kiltinny, 1816. Died 1832.—Fr. Ranson, C.C.]

Gorman, Darby, Kellsistown, Co. Westford.

13 Sept. 1794—13 Sept. 1798. Dr. and Ct. beheaded 1 guinea. [Cf. Jeremiah Gorman, C.C., The Hook, 1822. P.P., Sutton's Parish, 1825. Died 1828.—Fr. Ranson, C.C.]

- Coleman, Patrick, Dame St., Dublin.**
30 Oct., 1794—30 July, 1795. Pension 20 guineas. [Entered Maynooth Dec., 1795.—Healy p. 733. Son of Francis Coleman, poplin mercer, 9 Dame St., he was educated in Paris, Louvain and Carlow. The Maynooth Calendar states he entered Maynooth in 1795 as a priest. Dr. Donnelly says "he was ordained in Liffey St., 1797." At the laying of the foundation stone of the new College, April, 1796, he read the Greek Ode before the Lord Lieutenant. In 1799 he was appointed lecturer in S. Scripture, the first student of Maynooth to be appointed to a post in his Alma Mater. In 1800 he was appointed first principal of the lay College, Canon of Dublin, 1812. P.P., St. Paul's, 1825. Precentor, 1827. P.P., St. Michael's, 1828. V.G., 1833. Died 1838, aged 65. Buried in the Pro-Cathedral vaults.—Fr. Brady, I.E.R., Aug., 1943, p. 95.]

- Johnston, John.**
25 Feb., 1795—30 June, 1801. Day Scholar to 27 Sept., 1797. Teacher in School of Humanity from Oct., 1797, to Oct., 1798. £28 8s. 9d. (£2 8s. 9d.) paid by Rev. Mr. Prendergast in 1801. Fr. Michael Prendergast, P.P., V.G., Donckree, 1796-1836. Dr. Prendergast was a near kinsman of the late Fr. Luke Byrne, P.P., Kildare. He is said to have refused the mitre of Kildare. He appears to have been the leader of the clergy in March, 1819, when they chose Fr. James Doyle, O.S.A., dignissimus. He himself was dignior on that occasion. He was appointed V.P. in Dec., 1819, and was V.G. in July, 1826. Cf. Fitzpatrick, Index, Comerford I., 101; III., 82, 84, 100.]

1 June, 1795—May, 1801. Day Scholar to 30 Sept., 1797. Fr. Joseph Tierney was born in Ballyknockan, where the family resided till about 1941. Soon after his ordination he went with three nieces, Cummins of Rathpead, whose home had been burned and who had been exiled in

- 1796, to live in France, where also they died. A nephew Patrick settled in Tullyland where happily his grandson, Mr. Park Cummins, still resides. Cf. Fr. Mathew Tierney, Carlow College, 1809-16; P.P. Caragh, 1831-57. Also Pat and Daniel Tierney, householders, Moneybeg, 1803.]

15 Sept., 1795—15 Sept., 1800. Pension 20 guineas. [Cf. James, Mourath, 1796; John, Mourath, 1799; Daniel, Mourath, 1813-15 (elderwards P.P., Ballyglass). Also Fr. James Lator, Clonagown, who died 1826, aged 26.—Comerford III., 136. Previous to 1823 the area now included in Ballyfin parish formed part of Clonagown or Mourath parish.]

It is said that Cardinal Cullen gave him facilities for confessions in his diocese. The great Cardinal had no other opinion, for he knew that Fr. Locke, as he was called, recognised no parochial or diocesan boundaries, on the grounds that there was no boundary to the mercy of God. A book, said Fr. O'Rourke, late P.P., Athy, could be filled with anecdotes about Fr.
- Locke.** He was well-known at Maher's, Donore, of which family Fr. O'Rourke's mother was a member. Mother Eyngelir, Goerbridge, was at his Requiem Office. There is another, probably a later, photo of Fr. McMahon at Knockbeg.]

17 Apr., 1796—17 Apr., 1801. Pension 20 guineas. [Fr. Anthony Goss was nephew to Dean Cullen, P.P., Leighlin, who died in 1833. Fr. Goss was C.C., Leighlin, 1800-20. He had charge of the building of Balthabrama Church. A holy-water font inside the East door and corresponding to the baptismal font on the opposite side is the gift of William Cullen, Scapton, to Fr. Goss in 1824. At the instance of Colonel Roelhorst and Mr. Alexander, who gave great help towards the building of the Church, I.K.L., appointed Fr. Goss administrator of Leighlin in 1827 in consequence of a disturbance in the parish. Fr. James Maher was appointed P.P., and Fr. Goss left. Neither Fr. Maher nor Fr. Goss is referred to by Dr. Comerford in his history of Leighlin parish. Fr. Goss died in Castlecomer. Fr. O'Farrell has a copy of a permit given by the Protestant bishop of Ossory to Anthony Goss, Solr., Castlecomer, to

- prove his uncle's (Fr. Goss's) will. Wm. Maloney, Mr. Roger, Ballina, Co. Kildare

In 1783 they went to Slenny; the place had previously been owned by the Montgomeries. According to the tombstone in the Graves, Thomas was born 1723 and died 1800. His wife was born 1751 and died 1827. They had ten children. Thomas McWeey was great grandfather of Mr. James McWeey, Slenny, and of Mr. Thomas McWeey, Wellington Square. Their eldest son, Matthew, settled in Ballyking, Ballymore, where his grandchildren now live. The second son, Thomas, was three months old when the parents went to Slenny. In 1832 he married Miss Anne Gaskin, daughter of Patrick who owned the shop at Wellington Bridge, and to whose business he succeeded. Murtha died a bachelor in 1854, aged 71, at Grange Mill, where his grandnephew, Mr. Thomas McWeey, lives. Simon, the fourth son, married Miss Brennan, Ballyhamon. He died in 1842 in Straboe, where Mr. Thomas Murphy, a marriage relative, now lives. John owned the millings in Green Lane, died in Rathbar in 1866, and is buried in Glasnevin. James, the youngest, married in 1829 Miss Ellen McDermott of Springhill, an only child. The four Coffey brothers died bachelors. A sister of theirs married a Starford of Westford; their sons were pupils of Carlow College, and were near cousins of Charles of Craig Bridge. Another sister married Robert Farrell, who had been a Carlow pupil, 1799-1804. They had two daughters, one of whom, Mrs. O'Reilly of Dublin, owned extensive property at Carlow. There is a monument dated 1750 to the Gaskins a few yards from Dean

Skelton's tomb in Slenny. The McWeey burial-place is a few yards beyond Bishop Keefe's tomb; the Coffey plot is nearly opposite on the west side of the walk. In 1794 Thomas Coffey owned the Sheaf Inn. Wm. Montgomery, owner of the "Yellow Lion," was elected Carlow Town Sergeant. He died 1791].

It was at the Castle and at this time his youngest brother Lawrence, Carlow College, 1816-20, and later P.P., Castlebar, Ardshean and V.G. was born. Q.V. The family burial ground was at Killeen, and later at Lewisstown. When it was proposed to close the Killeen churchyard and embody it in a plantation scheme, Archbishop Dunne urged those who had friends buried there to sign a petition to have it kept open. The petition was successful. A respected local resident remembers the Ardshean consecrating a portion of the Lewisstown cemetery. Mr. Campbell lives in the old Dunne homestead].

During the years of suppression they had worked as secular priests in St. Michael's parish, Dublin. All through the 18th century the Jesuits had worked in this parish. In 1750 Fr. John Austin, S.J., had begun his classical school in Saul's Court, off Fishamble St., on the south side of the river. He had as helpers Fr. Richard O'Callaghan and Dr. Beisig. Dr. Prinket, Bishop of Meath, in a "Relatio Status" of 1799, reported that he had adopted this school as a diocesan seminary for Meath. Dr. Murray, Archbishop of Dublin, Bishop

Rhike of Dromore, Monsignor William Yore, V.G., and Fr. Peter Kenney, founder of the Irish province of the restored Society, had been pupils of this famous school. Between 1801 and 1804 Father O'Callaghan sent eight students to Carlow College. He paid full pension for them. At the beginning of his career he had spent many years in the Philippines, and had a portion of his tongue cut off by the natives. He was born 1738 in Meath, and died 1807—Battersey, "Jesuits in Dublin," p. 91].

Yore, William, Dublin.
6 June, 1801—9 April, 1809. Rev. R. Callaghan paid entrance, and pension to 1 Apr., 1804. From that date till 1 Sept., 1806, there is no record. Vacation 1807 entered, but not charged for. Born 22 May, 1781, in Upper Church St. in the parish of St. Paul. The entry in the neat and well-kept register reads: "William, son to John and Catherine Egora. Sponsors Thomas Maguire and Judith Quinn." The entry for an older brother reads: Richard to John and Catherine Eway. May 21st, 1777." Possibly the name was pronounced with two syllables, Yo-ree, and these were phonetic attempts, e.g., Ewey.—Fr. Michael Moran, C.C., St. Paul's Pupil in Dr. Beisig's School, Saul's Court. From 1804-6 he was a novice in Stonyhurst. C.C. in St. James's Parish and Chaplain to Kilmaham, 1809. In 1828 he established the cemetery at Golden Bridge, and founded the Catholic Book Society, for which I.K.L. wrote the prospectus. P.P., St. Paul's, 1830. Elected St. Paul's Church, 1835. V.G., 1837.

- Domestic Pochte, 1864. For the 34 years of his pastorate he was leader of every charitable movement in the diocese. A list of the charitable and educational institutions of which he was sole or joint founder would be a long one. They include the Institutes for Deaf and Dumb, Blind Asyiums, All Hallows, St. Vincent's Academy, Ushers' Quay, Ghazevia Cemetery. His name was synonymous with charity. At a banquet in Morrison's hotel, Dublin, held after the consecration of the Pro-Cathedral, Nov., 1825, Sir Thomas Esmonde, who presided, proposed the health of the preacher, Dr. Doyle. Sir Thomas Esmonde, presumably his son, and William O'Brien befriended the exiled tenants of Lugganreen. Sir Thomas Carrow student of 1802, was a brother of Fr. B. Esmonde, S.J., intimate friend of J.K.L., who remonstrated successfully with J.K.L. on behalf of his brethren at Clonsilla. "Few know him better than I do. Through generally believed to be heart-stroke, the fact is that when proper evidence is brought no one modifies his opinion with more candour." He pleaded successfully also with Dr. Doyle for a group who had incurred excommunication. When the new Cathedral was about to be roofed Fr. Esmonde, who was a competent judge of architecture, urged J.K.L. to add 25 feet more to the height of the walls. Dr. Doyle restricted them and ever after that the state of his funds did not permit this. He told Fr. The records of the established Church, Dunleckney parish, show that at a Vestry held 21 Feb., 1803, it was resolved that in order to provide substitutes for the 22 men whom the parish of Dunleckney was bound to furnish to the militia of the County, the sum of £142 10s. 0d. was necessary to be levied. Of this, £13 17s. 10d. was to be raised off housekeepers in the town of Moneybeg, as follows:—McNolan, Daal Magra, Pat Corcoran, Pat Tierney, Dan Tierney, Jerome Hanlon, John McDonald, Jas. Neal, Hugh Dooley, Miel. Connolly, Wm. Rooney, — Rice (?) Mr. Robert Browne, Mr. Robert Burrows, Mr. Wm. Shingleton, Mr. Nolan, Master; Robert Cahill, Mc. Connolly, Thos. Boyle, Pat Foley, — Sutton, Jas. Bull, Owen Lyons, Pat. Murphy. (Memorials of the Dead, I., 305). The earliest reference to the name of Bagnalstown is found in the same work: John and Robert Burrows of Bagnalstown for the year 1807.—Vol. II., 36. [Spelling as above. Amount levied in each case omitted.]

A description of the place in 1835 shows a town of 1315 inhabitants, beautifully situated on the River Barrow, and on one of the mill coach roads from Dublin to Kilkenny. It was a place of considerable trade and was rapidly rising to importance. There were some extensive corn-mills. There were 12 farms. There were quarter sessions and weekly petty sessions. The Courthouse was a handsome building in the Grecian style. There was also a large and handsome R.C. Chapel and a dispensary.—Lewis, Topographical Dictionary, 1837, p. 99. Mr. Tomas O'Neill, M.A., kindly furnished the references.]

Both parents were married in Ballyadams before they emigrated to U.S.A. Archbishop Riordan on his visits to Ireland used spend a week at Carlow College. On one occasion, the President, Mgr. Burke, and he visited B. Blyadams where his parents had lived. A man who was working on the road pointed out the place, still used as a dwelling. "Just down that lane they lived," he said. "I heard they did well and had two sons priests." The Archbishop wept. At his last visit in 1910 he gave a grand address. He said Mass for the students and gave them Holy Communion. His secretary was with him. His brother, Fr. Riordan, used stay with the Bishop. The Archbishop in 1910 drove to Kilkenny. It may be only a coincidence that the Clarks who lived on Greig Bridge where Miss Foley is now, were nearly related to Bishop Walsh, who was a near cousin of Dr. Doyle, Nicholas or, as he was called, "Nico Walsh," said to be a brother of Dr. Walsh, kept a coal and timber yard in Bachelors Walk. Mr. Clarke who, like Mr. Walsh, came from New Ross, succeeded Mr. Walsh and kept on the same business. Mother Joseph Walsh, Tuilove Convent, was born in the house on the bridge. So also was Fr. Daniel Clarke, 1809-1916, who studied in Carlow and Kerick Seminary for the diocese of St. Louis. Fr. Tim Dempsey preached his funeral sermon. Cf. Nicholas Walsh, Carlow student, 1814-15 and Rev. James Walsh, Ferns diocese, Carlow 1817-18. The Clarks are buried in Killeishin].

The student Croak was, I think, an uncle of Dr. Clarke of Cashel, and lived to a great age as P.P., Charleville. I will gladly obtain for you as much information as I can about the priests on your list. I am sending the list to Father Rice. Carlow College will always remain in my mind with the happiest of memories. I was ordained in the College Chapel in Oct., 1823, by Dr. Connerford, and I spent six happy years on the College Staff. . . ."

An address "together with a cup of consecrable value was presented by the students of rational, moral and natural philosophy to their late professor, Rev. Michael Slattery, A.M.," on his leaving Carlow 22 June, 1815. Dr. Slattery became P.P., Borrisoleigh, where he built a church. In 1833 when Dr. Doyle's life was drawing to a close, he wrote to Mayothen strongly recommending Dr. Slattery for the presidency which was then vacant. Dr. Slattery was appointed Archbishop of Cashel. He completed the building of St. Patrick's College, Thurles, and opened it for students, Sept., 1837. When Peet's proposal in 1845 for the establishment of the Queen's Colleges led to a division of opinion among the Irish hierarchy, Dr. Slattery was a prominent member, if not the leader, of the large number of bishops who refused to support Dr. Murray, Archbishop of Dublin, in his policy of giving a fair trial to the Colleges. The majority insisted on the scheme being condemned as dangerous to the faith and morals of Catholics. The teaching was endorsed by a rescript from Promezanda issued in 1847. He was one of two Irish

Archbishops whose opinion, asked by Rome, secured the appointment of Archbishop Cullen as Archbishop of Armagh, and Apostolic Delegate, the other Archbishop was Dr. John Melchale of Tuam. At the National Synod of Thurles in 1850, the first held in Ireland since 1177, the bishops unanimously reiterated their condemnation of the Colleges. He died 4 Feb., 1857.—Comertford I., 176. D.N.B. John Kinella of Rathrush, P.P., Edenderry, 1825-1905; Frs. John and William Maher, Ballyfoughlan, and Dr. Joseph Nolan, Tullow. The mother of the two Frs. Nolan was Miss Maher of Donore. As Bishop Cor-

coran was infirm, Fr. Tom was ordained by Dr. Troy 21 Dec., 1818, in St. Michael and John's, Dublin. He became Curate in Clongall to Fr. Martin Doyle, P.P., cousin of J.K.L. His health was poor, for in May, 1819, we find Fr. James Doyle, at this time dignissimus for Kildare, writing to Fr. Martin wishing sincerely that "poor Tom" was removed not only because he was a burden to Fr. Martin, but for Fr. Tom's own health. About the same time he wrote to the Vicar-Capitular at Ballin.

Fr. James Conran, P.P., suggesting a number of changes among the curates for his consideration. Eventually only three changes were made: Fr. Tom Nolan, C.C., Clongall, to Hacketstown; Fr. Daniel Lalor, who had probably been C.C., Tullow, C.C., Clongall, and Fr. William Clowry of the College to be C.C., Tullow.

Fr. Lalor was nephew of Bishop Corcoran who died 22 Feb., 1819. On 30 Nov. of the same year J.K.L., writing to a sister of Fr. Tom, a nun in Cork, doubted if Fr. Tom, for whom he had a particular esteem, would survive the winter and spring.

As soon as he became Bishop, Dr. Doyle revived the contentions of the clergy, which had lapsed since 1798. At the first conference of what is now the Kildare deanery, held in 1820 in Robertstown, Fr. Tom was present, and J.K.L., noticing that he still looked very delicate, told him he would send him as C.C. to his home-parish, Mysall, where he would have the advantage of his mother's care.

From Mysall he went as C.C. to Stradbally to Dr. Dowling, V.G., the saint in his cell, as Dr. Doyle called him, in whose presence the great bishop was awe-stricken, and who was Pastor of Stradbally for fifty years and nine months. In 1829 he succeeded Fr. Clowry as Adm., Tullow, where he built the church spire, the first built in Ireland after Emancipation. He became Adm., Ballylinn, in 1836, and in 1838 P.P., Abbeystick. He founded the Bridgide Convent there. All his life he was his people's champion against landlord aggression. In Abbeystick he gave active support to the land movements led by Pat Lalor, and later by his son Richard. He died in 1886, the patriarch of the clergy of Ireland. He used say he was eight years old in 1798, though others

believed he was born in 1794. His brother, Fr. John, who was 20 years younger, born 1 Jan., 1810, predeceased him in 1880. A sister, a nun in South Presentation Convent, Cork, who was delicate in 1822 and whom J.K.L. took for granted would fall with the leaf of the year, was still vigorous in 1880—"Catholic Registry," p. 145. J.K.L. had a particular esteem for Fr. Kinsella and for the family, whom he used visit at Rathrush—J.K.L.'s spelling—while he was professor in Carlow. According to his own entry in the parochial books, Fr. Kinsella was appointed P.P. of Ballon, 9 Aug., 1825. He died at Rathrush 26 Jan., 1872. About three years before he had resigned the pastoral charge. He was buried in the old Chapel which was between the present Church and the gate. Later his remains were transferred to the new Chapel. The Earl of Wicklow said that in Dr. Doyle's diocese no tithes were paid, and not a tithie of the tithie in other parts. Fr. James Germane, C.C., Castledermot, afterwards P.P., and Canon in Ahy, was of the Newtown family. He was a signatory to an address from the priests and people of Castledermot to Cardinal Wiseman when he visited Castledermot and Carlow in 1858. During that visit the Cardinal stayed at his

- cousins, JEstranges at Graney House. The Cardinal's mother was an Estrange of Strange, Ayrwardtown Castle, Co. Kilkenny. The Estrange family came from Anislogue about 1820 and succeeded a Mr. Fishbourne, who was agent for the Butler estate, at Graney House. About 1869 Nicholas Wiseman Strange, Graney Ho., was a pupil at Knockree. About 1870 Graney House was bought by Mr. John Germaine of Bessina, father of the present owner, Mr. Edward P. Germaine. His death was the result of a murderous attack on him near Rathoe cross-roads by a party of robbers who, in the darkness, mistook him for a member of the Nolan family of Tinneclash returning from the fair of Castledermot where he had sold a valuable horse. Fr. Lyons was dragged from his horse and was badly mauled before the miscreants discovered their mistake. They thereupon bolted and left Fr. Lyons to his fate. He never recovered from the shock and bruises of this attack. Fr. Lyons had brought his niece, Mary Delany, to Rathvilly parish as a teacher. The reports of the Education authorities at the time show that she was a most efficient teacher, for in addition to her meagre salary of £10 a year, they

granted to her, more than once, a special premium of £5. Miss Delany afterwards married a Mr. Murphy, a native of the North of Ireland, who had been organist in Carlow and choir-master in the College. His coming to Rathvilly was due to Fr. Gahan who knew Mr. Murphy in the College when Fr. Gahan was a professor there. During his time in Rathvilly, where he died and is buried with his wife, Mary Delany, he organised a splendid brass band which provided the accompaniment for Sunday Vespers, which were sung on alternate Sundays in Rathvilly and Tynock new Chapel's, which was completed by Fr. Gahan while he was Administrator of the parish. Their daughter Kathleen, mother of the late Fr. John Lawler, P.P., Ballon, himself an accomplished musician, was organist and trained the choir and many musicians in Rathvilly down to Mgr. Delany's time as P.P.—Fr. O'Farrell].

Clancy, Mr. —, Tullow.

8 Sept., 1809—1 July, 1816. Day-boy to 2 Sept., 1810. Spelt McDonnell in Book No. 4. [Fr. Michael McDonald, a native of Ballon parish, was appointed C.C., Killeslin, in 1817. Owing to the age and infirm health of the Pastor, Fr. R. Fitzgerald, the care of the parish was in large measure entrusted to Fr. McDonald. There was a warm friendship between the future J.K.L. and the young priest. On 7 Mar., 1819, Fr. McDonald was the bearer of a message from the brilliant young professor at Carlow to the Vicar-Capitular, Fr. James Corran, P.P., Ballon. The Vicar-Capitular had asked Dr. Doyle to come to Ballon to draft and write certain letters: these were probably to the Vicars of the demerries requesting them to convene the clergy for Dr. Corcoran's month's mind and for the purpose of recommending a successor in the See. Dr. Doyle excused himself from going, on the grounds of delicacy at visiting the Vicar-Capitular at such a time. He drafted the letters, however, and Fr. McDonald at his request wrote them, and brought them to the Vicar-Capitular for signature. At this time Fr. McDonald was engaged in building a new Church in Killeslin. The foundation-stone of the Church of the Holy Cross was laid 6 May, 1819. The architect was Cobden, who was afterwards to design the Cathedral. Cobden built the house in which Mr. W. Duggan now resides, and there he lived.—(Fr. F. Hickey, Kiltegan). In May, 1821, Dr. Doyle obtained from Pope Pius VII. a decree granting a plenary indulgence on the usual conditions to all who should visit between sunrise and sunset the parochial church of Killeslin dedicated under the invocation of the Most Holy Cross on the feast of the Holy Cross or any day within the octave, and there pray for the propagation of the Faith. In May, 1822, High Mass was celebrated in the new Church, and Dr. Doyle preached. In the following month Dr. Doyle came to live at Off Derrig. Fr. McDonald appears to have lived with him, as did Fr. James Maher later. Dr. Doyle lavished on Fr. McDonald all the fondness and kindness of a parent. In Nov., 1822, the bishop wished to send Fr. McDonald to visit his own friends in

Wexford, as he himself was "as it were, nailed to the diocese." Great was the bishop's grief at the death of the young priest some months later. Dr. Doyle, surrounded by priests, entered the room where the body lay. "There are several priests in this diocese," he said, "of whose fidelity as theologians I am justly proud . . . but on the decision of none in any difficult question of theology would I have as soon relied as on that of the beardless boy who lies dead." Father McDonald is buried in Holy Cross Church on the epistle side. A mural tablet erected by Dr. Doyle in 1823 commemorates "Fr. Michael McDonald who having erected this Chapel and improved by his labours the morals and piety of his parish, died in the 7th year of his ministry and 32nd of his age." Fr. McDonald was born at Grangeford, where Mr. William Sheppard, the present representative of the family, now lives. He was a class-fellow of Fr. Wm. Kinella of Rathrus, afterwards P.P., Ballon. He was 3 years senior to Fr. Wm. Kinella of Ballyunnery, afterwards Bishop of Ossory, and two years senior to Fr. John Nolan of Tinneclash, C.C., Ballinacill, and Fr. Wm. Clowry of Ballintrene, Adm., Tullow.—Cf. Fitzpatrick I., 33, 225, 369; II., 521. Comerford III., 248. "Carloviana," 1947, p. 8].

In the summer of 1817 he went to Rome to complete his studies. He was followed there three years later by his nephew, Paul Cullen, who was his junior by 10 years, and who had spent three years at Carlow College. In 1821 Fr. Maher was ordained, and soon after set out for home. His first Curacy was Kildare, but after a few months he was transferred to Carlow. He lived with J.K.L. at Old Derrig. At Michaelmas, 1826, Dr. Doyle removed to Braganza, and presumably the priests, including Fr. Maher, C.C., and the Adm., Fr. Terence O'Connell, went there also. In 1827 Fr. Maher was made P.P., Leighlin, and towards the end of 1830 he was translated as P.P. to Paulstown and Goresbridge. While here, he lived at Mr. Aby Wynne's, Kellymount House. In 1833, at the wish of Dr. Doyle, whose health was failing, he resigned the parish and came as Adm. to live at Braganza. Fr. Maher ever cherished a great love for the memory of Dr. Doyle, to whom he was V.G., and later executor. In his own will Fr. Maher left £20 to keep in repair the statue of Dr. Doyle. At the close of 1837, Fr. Maher was appointed Professor of Theology and Sacred Scripture in Carlow College. On 3 Feb., 1840, the students presented an address to Fr. Maher, Professor of Sacred Scripture. In Jan., 1841, he became P.P., Graigue. In 1844 owing to ill-health he went to Rome for two years. He stayed at the Irish College, of which his nephew, Dr. Paul Cullen, later Cardinal, was Rector. During the famine of 1847 he gave abundant proof of his devotedness. He used cross the barrow in a boat with dead bodies.

victims of the cholera, to have them buried in a plot adjoining the Graves; they were not allowed to go by land. Soon after the Famine he went to live in Carlow College, and continued to live there till a few years before his death. He died Holy Thursday, 2 April, 1874. Cardinal Cullen, Bishop Walshe and his coadjutor and 200 priests attended the obsequies. Dr. Moran, Bishop of Ossory, was celebrant. He was buried in the old Church of Graigue. In the presence of Most Rev. Dr. Keogh, Bishop of Kildare and Leighlin, and a large body of priests and laity, his remains with those of his three successors were placed in the grounds attached to the new Church of St. Clare. There are at least six parishioners who from childhood remember Fr. Maher, and who hold his memory in reverent affection. For his great charity, and his zeal for his people's highest interests, the people of Killeslin revere his memory as that of a saint. Daniel O'Rourke, P.P., Allen; the Very Rev. John O'Rourke, P.P., Ballyfin, and Mr. Dan McDonnell, Carlow, and great granduncle of Mr. James McWey, Sleaty. Fr. James Maher was an uncle of Cardinal Cullen. In the I.E.R. of 1893, Fr. Matthew Russell devotes a page and a half, 352-3, to a list of relatives of Cardinal Cullen, the Mahers, Cullens, Kearneys, Cummins, Morans, who became priests or nuns, and the list is not complete. Lyons, Thomas Cummins and Phil Haly
are carried in that order to Book No. 4,
and the address entered in each case is
Co. Carlow. [Rev. Philip Healy, after-
wards V.G., was a native of Paulstown
parish and a relative of the late Monsignor
Brophy, V.G. He was C.C., Ballinakill, in
October, 1824 ("Schools of Kildare and
Leighlin," p. 389). In October, 1825, he
was transferred as C.C. to Philipstown
On 1st February, 1829, he was appointed
P.P., Clonmore. He built the spacious
Romanesque Church at Ballyconnell to
replace the old Mass-house chapel at
Knockballestein, the site of which is now
almost forgotten, as is the "holy corner"
in the same townland, where Mass was
offered in the penal days. In 1834 he
was translated as P.P. to Monasterevan.
He purchased the site for the present
parochial Church of Monasterevan, which
he built. Very Rev. Fr. Gorry, P.P., tells
the story of the purchase, which Dr.
Comerford, Fr. Healy's successor, forgot
to include in his history of the parish.
The land on which the Church is built
was leased by the Drogheda family to a
man named Coyle for 1,000 years. Coyle
mortgaged the ground, and this mortgage
was sold and re-sold many times until
Fr. Healy bought it for £75 in the public
courts. In a short time he applied for a
declaration from the Court that the lands
were his, as Coyle and his family were
scattered to the ends of the earth, with no
chance of recovery from them of the
mortgage money. The Court granted the
application, and Fr. Healy proceeded to
build the Church. Fr. Healy was one
of the priests whom J.K.L. said he would
recommend as his successor. At the voting
of the parish priests to recommend a
successor to Dr. Haly in 1855, Fr. Philip
Healy, Vicar-Capitular, was placed digni-

on the list. He was V.G. from 1859 to
his death on 2 June, 1878, aged 86 years.
He was a brother of Rev. Andrew Healy,
P.P., Mountmellick, q.v.—Fr. O'Farrell,
Chaplain, Killashee].

Nowlan, Master Michael, Co. Kilkenny.

22 Oct., 1809—1 July, 1816. Was an
Extern 1815-16. [Seems to be Fr. Nowlan
of Leighlin who was appointed C.C.,
Graignamanagh, in 1815. That date on
J.K.L.'s list should probably be 1816.
Paulstown, Co. Kilkenny, up to 1822
formed part of Leighlin parish. In 1830
he left the parish to see a dying kinsman,
and when that fact was brought to J.K.L.'s
notice by the P.P., Fr. Martin Doyle, the
bishop wrote: "Mr. Nolan is only linger-
ing from hour to hour, and it is hard to
send away from him his only near friend,
but I will say what you wish to your
curate and if the danger be not imminent
I am sure he will return: if it be I think
you would not wish him home." In
January of that year he had asked Fr.
Martin to be his agent with the priests of
St. Mullins and with his own C.C., Fr.
No'an, in the meritorious cause of the
new Cathedral. Fr. Michael Nolan was
C.C. in Graignamanagh till his appoint-
ment as P.P. of Myshall, January, 1839.
He died 1852, aged 60. Cf. Martin
Nowlan, K. & L., Co. Kilkenny, 1816-19;
P.P., Kill, 1842-49, probably his brother.
M. Joyce, Carraigead, a relative of Fr.
Martin Doyle, has preserved a tradition
that a sister of Fr. Martin married a
Mr. Nolan in Clonegal, and that Fr. M.
Nolan, who was his C.C. in Graig, may
have been a brother, or son, of that Mr.
Nolan. The tradition may refer to Fr.
Michael Nowlan, son of Mr. James
Nowlan, Clonegall, who followed his
ecclesiastical course in France, where he
was ordained in 1844. He died March,
1845, aged 25, and is buried in Clonegal.
That Fr. Martin had a nephew a priest
is clear from J.K.L.'s letter to him, dated
19 Sept., 1827: "I am sorry to hear of
your nephew's illness; when he is well I
will, I believe, have too much occasion
for his services to spare him to you for
the present." Fr. Martin had just gone
from Clonegal as P.P. to Graig. In
Mysheal there is a tradition that Fr.
Michael Nolan, P.P., was a native of

the parish: that he was born either at
the Scraeoe or on the New Line between
Mr. E. Brennan's and Mr. Kennedy's Cross.
If we accept the tradition, Fr. Michael's
family, including, as we believe, the future
P.P. of Kill, Fr. Martin, moved to Pauls-
town, and from there the two boys went
as pupils to Carlow College. Fr. Michael
is buried in Mysheal Church at the 11th
Station. Cf. Fitzpatrick II., 232, 525.
Comerford III., 172, 320].

born in Dunleckney parish. The family
had lived at Kilkennor before they went
to Carrick in the same parish. They were
uncles of Fr. John Kehoe, P.P., Ballon
(1869-83), who was uncle of his successor
as P.P., Fr. P. F. Nolan, and of the late
Mr. John A. Kehoe, Rathvindon. Fr.
Nolan was first cousin of Fr. E. O'Leary,
P.P., V.F., Portarlinton, and uncle of Fr.
Matthew Lalor, P.P., V.F., Portarlinton.

held in high esteem by Dr. Doyle, who
wrote his epitaph. "His zeal, his eloquence
and polemic writings placed his name when
he had only arrived at manhood among
the most distinguished in the Church of
Ireland." Fr. Clowry was born in Bally-
brombil, near Fenagh, within two fields
of where the road crosses the river on
land now owned by Mrs. Nicholas Nolan,
Kilkennor. A draw-well marks the site
of the house. His father, known for many
years after as Farmer Clowry, was mur-
dered at his house at night time during
the 1798 period. He had shown hospit-

ality to Wexford insurgents who were staying in a barn on an adjoining farm. Other circumstances of the crime belong to the history of the locality. His wife offered the murderers a sieve of gold—there were no banks outside Dublin in these days—and valuables in the hope that they would spare her husband. They took the valuables, shot her husband in his own yard, looted the house and burned the whole place. The widow and her young family, including William who was about six years old, and a younger child, removed to Ballintrae, where they built the house in which Mr. Patrick Kealy now lives. Later the family were evicted from there and went to Kilbricken. Fr. William was uncle of Fr. Patrick Clowry, C.C., Caragh, who died 26 Aug., 1883, and is buried in Caragh Church, where the high altar was erected to his memory by the parishioners and Mr. Jeremiah Clowry, his brother. Fr. Patrick was born in Kilbricken, where his grandnephew, Mr. Reginald Maher, now resides. Father William's epitaph does not give the day or month of his death. Fitzpatrick, however, states that a month after J.K.L. had the happiness of seeing Dr. Kinsella elevated to the episcopate, he had the sorrow of writing the epitaph of another beloved pupil, Fr. Clowry. Fitzpatrick seems to refer to Dr. Kinsella's consecration, which took place 26 July, 1829: his brief was dated 15 May.—Comerford I, 192. Carrigan I, 223. Fitzpatrick II, 145 and Index].

C.F. Mr. Kinsella, Extern 1 Sept., 1811, to 1 July, 1812. [Fr. Wm. Kinsella, afterwards, 1829-45, Bishop of Ossory, was born in 1796 in Ballynurey, in the place now owned by Mr. O'Toole, in the parish of Ballon. The family left Ballynurey in or soon after 1798. Thiry, and according to some, fifty families were evicted from Kellsion and district at this period. The family is the same as the Kinsella family who lived in Grange where Mr. Wm. Condeil now lives. Luke of this family married in Grange, and his brother William married Miss Eliza Novian into Lovet Grange, now Malahida, where their grandson, Mr. James Wm. O'Leary, now lives. The early burial ground of the Grange family was at Rahy, on the lands now owned by Dr. Egan, where there is a tombstone to Mary Kinsella, who died 17 Mar., 1803 (or 1808), aged 66, and her husband Luke, who died 15 June, 1810, aged 78, erected by their son John. William Kinsella of Malahida died 1891, aged 73. Dr. Kinsella's early career is given in his own handwriting on a slip of paper in the Ossery archives: "Born

2 Feb., 1796. Entered College as day-scholar Oct., 1807, 114 years. Entered as boarder Sept., 1814, 184 years. Minor Orders 4 June, 1816, 20 years. Sub-deaconship 28 May, 1817, 21 years. Appointed Secretary 1 June, 1817, 21 years. Deaconship 15 May, 1818, 22 years. Appointed Professor of Natural Philosophy Sept., 1818, 22½ years. Ordained priest 18 Dec., 1819, 24 years nearly. This was Dr. Doyle's first ordination. Like Dr. Nolan, Fr. Clowry and Fr. James Maher, Dr. Kinsella had been a member of Dr. Doyle's famous Rhetoric Class of 1813. As Secretary he supervised the building of the South and North Wings. He was the first Vice-President of the College. He was a noted preacher and polemic writer. On a critical occasion he defended Dr. Doyle against O'Connell. In his evidence before the House of Lords in 1825, O'Connell, in his anxiety for emancipation, had asserted—wisely or unwisely—to the proposal that the 40 shilling freeholders be disfranchised. On his return to Ireland he was taken to task by the Irish people. In St. Audeon's parish, Dublin, a meeting was held to condemn those measures which had come to be known derisively as the "Wings." O'Connell in an eloquent speech stated he had done nothing without the previous approval of Dr. Doyle and Archbishop Murray. When O'Connell's speech was brought to Dr. Doyle's notice, he broke down and cried like a child. He was too distressed to reply himself, so he asked Dr. Kinsella to reply for him. In his tenth letter, published at the beginning of that very year, J.K.L. had strongly condemned the threatened disfranchisement of the people. "Take the elective franchise from the Irish peasant and you not only strip him of . . . this right, but you disable him and his posterity ever to acquire it. He is now poor and oppressed; you then make him vile and contemptible. . . . I would expect that if it were proposed to the Catholics to barter the elective franchise for emancipation that they would reject the unworthy compromise. I do hope they . . . can see that this franchise is the germ of Ireland's greatness. . . . That Dr. Doyle was the author of the J.K.L. letters was well known. While giving evidence before

the Committee of the House of Lords that year he had been asked: "Are you acquainted with the letters which were published under the title of J.K.L.—I have seen them. Do you concur in the opinion given in those letters . . . ?—I . . . most explicitly; and I believe they are the same in substance as those expressed in the letters alluded to, if those letters be understood in the sense in which I understand them myself." Dr. Ullathorne referring to the evidence given by Dr. Doyle and O'Connell in London, quoted an English peer as saying that Dr. Doyle had as far surpassed O'Connell as O'Connell surpassed other men. As Bishop of Ossory, Dr. Kinsella built the new St. Kieran's College, St. Mary's Cathedral, and many fine parochial churches. His "Controversial Letters," written like Fr. Clowry's in connection with the Bible dispute in Carlow, were published in 1826. His bust, with those of O'Connell, J.K.L. and Dr. Fitzgerald, the President under whom he served, is in the Senior Library of the College.—Carrigan I., 223. Comerford I., 191. Fitzpatrick I., 389, 409, 429 and Index. J.K.L. "Letters on State." Murray, p. 563. According to a tradition preserved by the late Mr. John Brophy, Conaberry, Fr. Bernard Kinsella, P.P., Praistown, who died 1870, was from Grange, and of the same family as Bishop Kinsella.

Kennedy, James. Nov., 1811—1 July, 1812. Extern. 3g. [Rev. Daniel W. Cahill, D.D., 1796-1864, was born in Ballynagill, parish of Ardes. Portion of the walls of the dwelling can still be seen. The 36 acre farm is now owned by Mrs. John McDonald, Ashfield

In 1816 young Daniel was sent to Maynooth by Bishop Corcoran, to whom he was related. According to a tradition preserved at Ballynagill, Dr. Doyle, who lived at the College Hill 1822, called at the room of a student named Cahill, who was preparing for ordination, and found him playing the violin at an unreasonable hour, and threatened he would not ordain him on the appointed day. "Welcome be your will, my Lord," said the student. Dr. Doyle turned back and said he would ordain him. Fr. Cahill was ordained by Dr. Doyle and was always held by him in the greatest esteem. He was sent as C.C. to Leighlinbridge, and in 1825 he was appointed Professor of Natural Philosophy in Carlow College. In 1830 he was sent by Dr. Doyle to Westford to collect for the Cathedral. In 1834 he established a school in Carlow, and in 1835 he opened a boarding-school at Spangin, Williamsstown, which in 1840 he transferred to Prosper, Blackrock. In this school, which later became the French College at Blackrock, now Blackrock College, he had 200 boarders. From 1830 to 1839 he lived in the diocese of Dublin. At this time he had become the greatest preacher and lecturer in Ireland. He lectured on Catholic subjects, on current national questions, on astronomy and natural science. His sermons and lectures were sold outside chapel doors on Sundays. He was engaged not only in Ireland but in England and Scotland. In 1859 he went to preach and lecture in America. Archbishop Hughes of New York said that if his office permitted it, he would willingly travel the whole area of America to hear Dr. Cahill's lectures. He died in Boston, 1864, aged 68. His dying wish was that his remains be brought to Ireland. Owing to the effects of the civil war, twenty years passed before his wish was fulfilled. In 1885 his body was taken up and brought to Ireland for re-interment. In Boston, New York, Cork and Carlow his remains were received with the highest honours by the ecclesiastical and civil authorities and by reverent thousands. His obsequies in Dublin took place in the Church of St. Paul, Arran Quay, which had been built by another Carlow man, Dr. William Yore, P.P., V.G. His tomb

is near that of the Liberator in Glasnevin. Besides the two editions of his works referred to by Dr. Comerford, there is a third fine edition, published by the late Patrick Cahill of Wellington Quay in 1838. His portrait is in the Physics Hall, Carlow College. Cf. Mr. John Cahill whose a/c. on a detached ship in one of the early registers shows that he was a boarder at Carlow College for the two years, and seven months preceding 5 July, 1803. He may be "Mr. John Cahill of Cloneyhannon near Carlow, a large landholder," who was recommended by J.K.L. in June, 1832, as suitable for giving evidence before a committee of House of Lords. John Cahill's evidence throws light on his own fine character as well as on his high standing in the South-Laosighs Carlow area, Cloneyhannon, where the P.P. lived, is beside Ballynagill. He seems to have been a brother of Dr. Cahill, and like their father, was a Civil Engineer. Cf. also John Cahill, student of St. Kieran's College in 1813, who in 1835 was C.C., Ballyfin, and who died C.C., Borris, 4 Dec., 1855. Cf. Rev. Thomas Cahill, born in Rosena 6 July, 1812. Carlow student at an early age, went to Maynooth, ordained 1841. After some five years on the mission in Kildare and Leighlin, he entered Mount Melkeray, where in religion he was Fr. Paul. He had a wide reputation as a spiritual director. He always wrote the personal pronoun first person singular as "I." He died 12 Jan. 1894. St. Albert Patrick Cahill, I.L.B., nephew to Dr. Cahill and Fr. Hickey, P.P., who lived at Castle-town where Mr. Stoeck now lives. A student of Carlow College, he was founder and first editor of "The Leinster Leader." He is buried at Ardes.—Rev. P. Birch, M.A. Mr. Michael Deegan, Rev. Conleth (Colin) O'Brien, O.Cist.
